

COMMUNITY AWARENESS

PHONE SCAMS

Nearly a third of all fraud is committed over the telephone. Criminals are experts at impersonating people, organisations and the police. They spend hours researching you for their scams, hoping you'll let your guard down for just a moment. Stop and think. It could protect you and your money.

STOP: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.



CHALLENGE: Could it be fake? Its ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

PROTECT: Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud.

Criminals can disguise their phone number to make it look like it's from a bank, the tax office, the police or anyone. They can call you with what looks like a genuine phone number. They will keep your landline open by not hanging up and even play a dialling tone over the phone. They can send text messages requesting you call them or click on a link. These scam messages can appear alongside genuine messages on your phone. They can send website links which can steal your data and money when you click on them.

Don't trust the caller id display on your phone, a phone number is not proof of id.

5 things to look out for on a scam phone call:

- 1. The caller doesn't give you time to think, tries to stop you speaking to family member or friend or is insistent and makes you feel uncomfortable.
- 2. The caller asks you to transfer money to a new account
- 3. The caller asks for your 4-digit card PIN, your passcodes or your online banking password. Even if they ask you to give it to them by tapping into the telephone keypad rather than saying the numbers out loud, this is a scam.
- 4. The caller asks you to withdraw money to hand over to them for safe keeping.
- 5. The caller says that you are a victim of fraud and offer to send a courier to your home to collect your cash, PIN, payment card or cheque book.

DRIVEWISE 65+



Safer Communities, Fife Council, have set new dates for the coming year for the Drive Wise 65+ initiative. This initiative is aimed at drivers 65+ years of age who would like to gain more confidence behind the wheel so that they can continue to drive safer for longer.

The course runs for 1 ½ hours and constitutes the driver driving their own car for about 20 minutes observed by a Road Policing Officer. This drive will cover different road layouts, different speed limits, junctions and roundabouts. The Officer will observe the drive and then chat to the driver about things they are doing well and things they can improve on to stay safe.

The session will be broken down to the following: 15 Mins – Registration, Checks and Pre-Evaluation 60 Mins – Observation Drive, Discussion Time, Opportunity to observe Police Officer driving shorter route

15 Mins – Post-Evaluation and Merchandise

The are sessions planned for this year are Tuesday 22nd April – Dunfermline Fire Station Thursday 29th May – Kirkcaldy Ford Centre, and Wednesday 25th June – St Andrews Fire Station

With time slots being from 0845 to 1015hrs, 0945 to 1115hrs, 1045 to 1215hrs, 1245 to 1415hrs and 1345 to 1515hrs.

Requirements

All drivers must bring their own car. This car must have a current MOT and driver must have a current licence. All details will be checked before the observation drive. A standard driving eyesight test will also be carried out.

There is no cost to sign up for this project as it is a free initiative. Drivers will be asked to use their own car for the observation drive and the route will be around 10-15 miles.

COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH INITIATIVE



Community Speed Watch is a voluntary scheme driven by members of the community and is supported by Police Scotland (Fife Division). Essentially,

it is a high visibility deterrent which strives to encourage motorists to reduce their speed, thus improving the safety and quality of lives of the local community.

The scheme runs during the summer months, so work is underway to have this up and running again from April 2025.



We currently have 10 volunteers and are actively seeking more to join our initiative in keeping our roads a safer place. We have a further 2 people who have expressed an interest.
